Rescuing The Environment Too!

If you've ever driven up the long gravel lane that leads to Noah's Ark Animal Foundation, you may have noticed three long, narrow, parallel strips of plantings on the east side of the drive, close to the road. You might think. Kind of a strange place to have garden beds. And what an odd shape! And you'd be right—if those three strips of plantings were just part of an ordinary garden.

But what you're seeing are actually miracles of green technology—sub-surface wetlands that are part of the shelter's unique septic system.

How it works at Noah's Ark is that the shelter's wastewater, both human and animal, flows to two separate septic tanks where it is partially treated and filtered. The "effluent" from the tanks then enters the first two gravel-filled wetland cells (one for each tank) that are populated with various species of wetland plants.

Wetland plants provide oxygen to the system, which enhances the treatment process. The wastewater becomes highly treated as it flows through the plant root zone in the cells. The water from the two cells then flows together into the third and final cell. At the end of that cell, the water is completely clean. (We test it regularly to make sure.)

Voila! The wetlands make sure that there's no exposure to untreated wastewater and no mosquito breeding grounds, while adding texture and character to its landscape by creating a natural habitat for plants and wildlife.

A truly green solution.

"But," as they say in the commercials, "that's not all!"

All of this is just part of our commitment at Noah's Ark to save the lives of animals, yet tread lightly on our planet.

We want to do our part to make sure that all animals and the folks who love them have a healthy world in which to live and play.

Noah's Ark has many other green features, including:

- Active solar panels to help heat the water that flows under the floors to keep the animals warm
- Ground-source-aided heating and cooling
- Super-insulated walls
- A high-efficiency furnace
- Non-toxic construction materials whenever possible
- High-efficiency appliances: front loading washer and dryer, low-energy-use refrigerator and dishwasher
- Increased number of windows and skylights to bring in natural light and reduce the need for artificial lighting
- Super insulated slab for energy efficiency in heating
- Low energy use lights: Fluorescent fixtures with electronic ballasts
- Fly ash cement for the slab. Fly ash, a waste product from coal-fired power plants saves on the use of Portland cement. Production of Portland cement now accounts for more than 8% of carbon dioxide emissions worldwide, the primary greenhouse gas causing global warming.

Heidi was so intelligent and so wonderful. She loved to lay her head on her catnip mice for her naps. She became upset when I cried or got upset myself. She did not particularly like anyone else but she



loved my husband and me (we have no children). She was one of the very best things that happened to us... coming into our lives.

She got her name because she spent her first week "hiding". We would wonder where she was and would say "She's hiding", probably from the horrific experience she lived through (she was in an enclosure in the basement of your shelter during the attack). Heidi seemed an appropriate name. But it did not take her long to learn trust and love us and us her. We will always love her.

I know that tragedy was horrendous and an undeniably atrocious act and should never have happened but through it we received a true gift from God.

We said good-bye to her yesterday with many tears and there will always be a void in our hearts... until, hopefully, we will see her another day when there are no mean people, no tumors, or cloudy days.

Update on the Rescue Waggin® Program

October is an important month for dogs. Not only is October Adopt-A-Dog month, it's the month when PetSmart Charities® celebrates the 50,000th dog taking a life-saving ride through their Rescue Waggin'® program a national transport program that transfers dogs and puppies from animal shelters with high pet populations to other animal shelters in other communities where adoptable dogs are more in demand.



As an official Rescue Waggin' partner, Noah's Ark will celebrate this milestone, along with 60 other shelters in the program, during their October Rescue Waggin' transport. On October 4th, Noah's Ark placed # 798 on the Rescue Waggin' vehicle.

One lucky dog

A chocolate lab named Chester rode the Rescue Waggin' vehicle in April 2011. Here is Chester's story: Chester, a sweet, energetic lab ended up at Noah's Ark after he was abandoned on a farm in the country. Soon after his arrival, the staff members noticed that he kept bumping into things. A local vet diagnosed Chester with severe cataracts. He needed surgery to restore his eyesight.

That's when PetSmart Charities® stepped in. Chester rode a Rescue Waggin' vehicle

to Animal Allies Humane Society in Minnesota. Once he arrived, an ophthalmologist performed the necessary surgery at a discounted rate and PetSmart Charities covered the cost.

One of the Animal Allies staff members described what happened after the surgery: "This morning when we took him outside for the first time, he stood still for several minutes just looking around." It was like Chester could finally see everything and was taking it all in!

Soon after recovering from the surgery, Chester was adopted by Steve and Debbie Inman. Debbie had met Chester shortly before his surgery. "I took him out for a walk and got to know him," Debbie says. She loved Chester's personality and liked the idea of getting an adult dog. "He needed a home," she explains. And Chester gets along great with the Inmans' other dog, Moose.

Now, that's a happy ending!
